

The first-ever film made in Saudi Arabia (a country with no movie theaters), and directed by a woman to boot, WADJDA tells of a spunky tenyear-old girl whose desire for a gleaming green bicycle sparks an entrepreneurial spirit that brings her into conflict with the plethora of rules by which her culture limits women. THE GANGSTER/CRIME FILM

Lecturer: Laurence Knapp

From August 30 through December 10, we offer a series of fourteen programs entitled *Public Enemies: The Gangster/Crime Film*, with weekly Tuesday lecture/discussions by Laurence Knapp, professor at Oakton Community College and author/editor of books on Clint Eastwood, David Fincher, and Ridley Scott. The series is presented in cooperation with the School of the Art Institute of Chicago's Department of Art History, Theory, and Criticism. Additional screenings of the films on Friday or Saturday do not include Prof. Knapp's lecture. Admission to all *Public Enemies* programs is \$5 for Film Center members; usual admission prices apply for non-members.

Public Enemies examines the changing status and historical contexts of the criminal in American and international cinema. The gangster/crime film has provided a format of considerable breadth and flexibility. The protagonist can be a hit man, convict, thief, private eye, renegade cop, drug dealer, corporate attorney, or serial killer. The setting can be America, Europe, Japan, or Brazil. The films can be about capitalism, masculinity, gender, race, sexuality, and existential despair. We will explore many of these possibilities in films by Sam Peckinpah, Fritz Lang, Jean-Luc Godard, Robert Altman, Martin Scorsese, Quentin Tarantino, Takeshi Kitano, and others.

In the post-apocalyptic future, Judges are a paramilitary police force that act as judge, jury, and executioner. Investigating a murder, Judge Dredd (STAR TREK's Urban) and his new recruit (Thirlby) find themselves trapped in an overcrowded tenement ruled by a brutal drug gueen (Game of Thrones's Lena Headev). With this stylish, hyper-violent, but tonguein-cheek thriller, director Travis and screenwriter Alex Garland (28 DAYS LATER) successfully restore Dredd to his underground UK comicbook roots. THE AMERICAN NEW WAVE

Watch for our next series, *The American New Wave*, beginning January 24, with weekly Tuesday lectures by Bruce Jenkins, professor at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and author/editor of books on Gordon Matta-Clark, Hollis Frampton, and Bruce Conner. Emerging in the late 1950s and early 1960s, the American New Wave—sometimes dubbed "the New York School" or "Off-Hollywood"—was led by a heterogeneous mix of artists and filmmakers ranging from the actor-director John Cassavetes to more avantgarde figures like the photographer Robert Frank and the dancer Shirley Clarke.
